SUBJECT: Projected Cost Comparison - GPPS & RCMP

## PREVIOUS COUNCIL / COMMITTEE DIRECTIONS

There are no previous Council/Committee directions.

#### BACKGROUND

In March of 2023, Council approved the transition from RCMP contracted policing services, to the City's own municipal force, Grande Prairie Police Services (GPPS). Although the decision was not solely based on budget, there are projected differences in costs that should be highlighted.

## **ANALYSIS**

Considering budget, Administration performed an analysis comparing projected RCMP contracted services costs to the expected GPPS costs. It is anticipated that GPPS will be less than RCMP contracted services (had it remained in place).

The analysis demonstrates a projection of both services, with the RCMP being projected as if the contract were to continue and compared against the 2025-2028 operating budget for GPPS. In order to project what RCMP would have cost into the future, we used the Multi-Year Plan (MYP) as provided by the RCMP to the City annually. The MYP forecasts multiple years of expected costs, based on 100 officers.

This projection assumes current staffing for RCMP and future plans for GPPS. Although the Police Commission is still finalizing the optimal officer count required for future service delivery, this analysis was done based on original plans of being at 110 officers by 2028. The RCMP contract projections are for only 100 officers (based on the RCMP MYP). So, with either the same amount of officers or more, the expected costs for GPPS are lower than what RCMP costs would have been.

Additionally, under RCMP contracted police services, the City is required to pay a share of divisional administrative costs, including item such as cadet training, legal services, recruitment, and other costs. These are a significant portion of costs each year, ranging upwards of \$5.5M to \$6M annually and another line item that the City will see cost savings from with a municipal police service. Under a municipal police service, there will still be administrative costs similar to those that the RCMP charge under contract, however they are expected to be significantly less.

It is expected that GPPS will be the police of jurisdiction in 2026, with the full transition away from RCMP being final in 2028. In 2028, the city is expecting to remain below what the RCMP budget would have otherwise been.

Although the decision to transition to a municipal police service was not strictly made based on budget, the City is expecting GPPS to cost less than contracted RCMP services. This will help reduce future tax levy increases.
